A. Personnel Statement

The goal of the proposed application is to identify helpful and harmful ways in which partners can help people newly diagnosed with type 1 diabetes adjust to their disease (i.e., enact better self-care, maintain high selfefficacy and good mental health). I have studied how people adjust to chronic illness for over 20 years, often emphasizing the initial adjustment period. I have focused on how both individual difference variables as well as relationship factors influence adjustment to coronary heart disease, breast cancer, and prostate cancer among adults. Over the last 15 years, I have extended this work to children and adolescents—and now emerging adults—with type 1 diabetes. I have conducted a great deal of research on social support, ranging from intervention work in which different kinds of support groups are manipulated among adults with cancer, to daily diary methodologies in one's naturalistic environment that examine more proximal effects of support interactions, to observational studies of support exchanges, to survey methods. Thus, I bring methods and skills that I have acquired from other areas to the subject matter of the proposed application—adult couples in which one person has type 1 diabetes. Specifically, I have experience with each of the method (e.g., videotaped conversations, daily diary) proposed in the present study. I have lectured on the use of EMA technology at a local workshop. I have an excellent track record of recruiting patient populations into longitudinal studies and maintaining high levels of retention (i.e., 10 years in samples of women with breast cancer and adolescents with diabetes). I also have experience with coding and analyzing qualitative data as well as the statistical analyses required by this application: correlation, repeated measures anova (or ancova), multiple regression, structural equation modeling, and multi-level modeling.
